Since 2003, Project ECHO has improved more than 225 million lives worldwide by increasing access to quality health care in hard-to-reach and underserved communities. The ECHO Model connects teams of specialists with frontline providers in virtual communities of practice, where all teach and all learn. This model for health care equity has been adopted by governments, NGOs and global health organizations, building critical workforce capacity to meet their urgent health priorities.

Financial support for Project ECHO helps to replicate the ECHO Model where it's most needed, ensuring that organizations adopting the model receive the training, technology and ongoing support they need to run and grow their programs. By helping changemakers in the field achieve their mission with contextually relevant solutions that they design and lead, the ECHO Model is inherently sustainable. Impact Highlights

INDIA

Founded by mother-daughter team, Dr. Radhika Batra and Dr. Shelly Batra, Every Infant Matters began in the rural state of Sikkim, India, with the goal of reducing child deaths and disabilities by training health providers in simple, life-saving procedures.

Since partnering with Project ECHO in 2021, they have been able to train over 350 health workers in Sikkim through the ECHO platform. [READ MORE](#)

INDONESIA

Indonesia’s Ministry of Health has ambitious goals: lower the maternal mortality rate; improve cancer outcomes for women and children; and, ultimately, establish universal health care coverage. With 10,000 primary health clinics for an archipelago of 17,000 islands, expanding capacity for treatment and diagnosis at earlier stages, especially through community health workers, is necessary to access higher-level care when it is needed.

Using the ECHO Model, they are training thousands of doctors, nurses, community health workers, and other providers with upskilled specialization in order to bridge this gap. [READ MORE](#)

AFRICA

Since launching in 2016, the ECHO network in Cote d’Ivoire has reached tens of thousands of health care workers in programs emphasizing early diagnosis and treatment of breast and cervical cancer, HIV/AIDS, and emergency response.

Now partnered with the Cote d’Ivoire Ministry of Health, the ECHO network in Cote d’Ivoire is tackling noncommunicable diseases, mental health, and long-COVID, and in 2024, launched the very first ECHO program targeting malaria. [READ MORE](#)

NEW MEXICO

New Mexico has the highest prevalence nationally of adults with four or more adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) which include domestic violence, parental substance use and sexual assault. A child with four or more has increased risk for chronic conditions such as depression, heart disease, and suicidality.

A New Mexico ECHO program took a new approach: tackle ACEs head-on by bringing together all child-facing service providers to build stronger, more timely safety nets for children who might otherwise fall through the cracks.
